Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Unless you are older than 102, you have never lived through a pandemic. And, in the unlikely event that you are older than 102 (I know for a fact that we don't have any Good Shepherd members who are centenarians) you were a child when it happened. The most recent pandemic was in 1918, often called "The Spanish Flu." That pandemic infected an estimated 500 million people globally and killed between 17 and 50 million. And while we have never been through a pandemic, others have.

Then, like today, many states banned large gatherings and ordered shutdowns of businesses, schools and yes, churches in an effort to stop the spread. Which means that the church has been through this before and come out on the other side.

It's interesting to look back and see that many of the issues the church was dealing with during the Spanish Flu are the same issues that we are dealing with today. Look back at the history and you will see that in 1918 churches were struggling with whether or not to discontinue having worship. And then, once they made the decision, how to meet the spiritual needs of their congregants. And remember, unlike today, there was no Zoom or YouTube! People used devotional materials, books, and pamphlets to sustain them Some churches suggested that families have worship in their homes at 11 a.m. on Sunday mornings and the clergy provided print sermons, service outlines and scripture readings to assist them with conducting the service.

And of course, like today, congregations were concerned about their finances. And remember, this was before people could give electronically! A Methodist pastor sent out this announcement with the weekly worship materials, "There will be no service at this church until further notice. If there be sickness among the members, please notify the pastor. The treasurer will be glad to hear from you. You will readily appreciate the importance of this announcement." A Lutheran pastor communicated this to his members, "As the churches may be closed for a period longer than two weeks all members are requested to remit their dues to the treasurer, J.M. Fox, 1819 Person Avenue, West End." It appears there is nothing new under the sun!

I find it comforting to read the history and learn that the church has been through this before and survived ... and they survived with far fewer resources than we have today! Yes, the church will look different than it looked when we entered quarantine in the middle of March, but maybe that will be a good thing! Maybe we will appreciate each other more and not take the community of faith, gathered in person, for granted. We will have learned new ways to use that technology that can work for us long after quarantine is over. And we will have been reminded, as the Sunday School song teaches us, "The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place, the church is the people." During this pandemic, we have not been closed, we have simply left the building. We continue to meet on Zoom, hold worship services on YouTube and serve the most vulnerable among us by feeding the hungry. Who knows? We might come out stronger and more faithful on the other side.

My prayers are with all of you in the days ahead. While we may be physically distant, we are together in the body of Christ.

SEPTEMBER OUTREACH—The September Outreach funds will support the merged Lutheran Seminary of Philadelphia and that of Gettysburg now called the **United Lutheran Seminary**. OCTOBER OUTREACH — The October Outreach funds will support **Women's Bridge of Eagleville** which serves women in 6 Southeastern PA counties. Their mission is to help women in transition achieve financial security, find adequate housing, obtain sustainable employment and gain emotional stability. They assist women in forming an action plan, job and interview skills, making productive life choices and referrals to other social service agencies and professionals. They offer classes in budgeting/money management and parenting. NOVEMBER OUTREACH —The November Outreach funds will go to support **Neighborhood Meals on Wheels**. There is a need in our community for meals for the homebound. Upper Merion Township has responded to that need for more than 40 years. Several organizers and volunteers are from Good Shepherd. Neighborhood Meals on Wheels accepts no government funding and as a result is able to bring new clients on board with much less paperwork than is required by the county and state. However, because it has no government funding it must rely on the generosity of friends, neighbors, community groups and faith-based organizations to sustain it. Dear Church, A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S by Lenny Duncan.

Zoom discussion Monday, September 14th at 7pm.

A group of Good Shepherd members gathered to begin a discussion around racism and how we can be part of the solution. Out of that discussion came the idea of reading a book. As a community of faith we will be reading Lenny Duncan's book, "Dear Church."

Lenny Duncan is the unlikeliest of pastors. Formerly incarcerated, he is now a black preacher in the whitest denomination in the United States: the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Part manifesto, part confession, and all love letter, *Dear Church* offers a bold new vision for the future of Duncan's denomination and the broader mainline Christian community of faith. *Dear Church* rejects the narrative of church decline and calls everyone--leaders and laity alike--to the front lines of the church's renewal through racial equality and justice. It is time for the church to rise up, dust itself off, and take on forces of this world that act against God: misogyny, nationalism, homophobia, and economic injustice. Duncan gives a blueprint for the way forward and urges us to follow in the revolutionary path of Jesus.

Pastor Duncan was recently ordained, but before ordination he did his internship at Saint Mark's Lutheran Church in Conshohocken ... right in our backyard.



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LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF 75,000 MASK CHALLENGE

Lutheran World Relief reached out in May requesting congregations to pledge home-sewn cotton face masks in order to assist vulnerable communities currently defenseless against COVID-19. Good Shepherd answered that call, pledging 500 masks. As the weeks progressed it was apparent that our goal of 500 would easily be surpassed. In August, 929 masks were shipped to Lutheran World Relief, sewn by several women at Good Shepherd and their friends. BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS — SUNDAY, OCTOBER 4th at 10:30 AM



Monday, September 28th—Refugee by Alan Gratz JOSEF is a Jewish boy living in 1930s Nazi Germany. With the threat of concentration camps looming, he and his family board a ship bound for the other side of the world . . . ISABEL is a Cuban girl in 1994. With riots and unrest plaguing her country, she and her family set out on a raft, hoping to find safety in America ... MAHMOUD is a Syrian boy in 2015. With his homeland torn apart by violence and destruction, he and his family begin a long trek toward Europe ... All three kids go on harrowing journeys in search of refuge. All will face unimaginable dangers -- from drownings to bombings to betrayals. But there is always the hope of tomorrow. And although Josef, Isabel, and Mahmoud are separated by continents and decades, shocking connections will tie their stories together in the end.



Monday, October 26th—Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI by David Grann In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Indian Nation in Oklahoma. After oil was discovered beneath their land, the Osage rode in chauffeured automobiles, built mansions, and sent their children to study in Europe.

Then, one by one, they began to be killed off. One Osage woman, Mollie Burkhart, watched as her family was murdered. Her older sister was shot. Her mother was then slowly poisoned.

And it was just the beginning, as more Osage began to die under mysterious circumstances.

In this last remnant of the Wild West-where oilmen like J. P. Getty made their fortunes and where desperadoes such as Al Spencer, "the Phantom Terror," roamed - virtually anyone who dared to investigate the killings were themselves murdered. As the death toll surpassed more than twenty-four Osage, the newly created F.B.I. took up the case, in what became one of the organization's first major homicide investigations. But the bureau was then notoriously corrupt and initially bungled the case.

Eventually the young director, J. Edgar Hoover, turned to a former Texas Ranger named Tom White to try to unravel the mystery. White put together an undercover team, including one of the only Native American agents in the bureau. They infiltrated the region, struggling to adopt the latest modern techniques of detection. Together with the Osage they began to expose one of the most sinister conspiracies in American history.



Monday, November 23rd—Small Great Things by Jodi Picoult Ruth Jefferson is a labor and delivery nurse at a Connecticut hospital with more than twenty years' experience. During her shift, Ruth begins a routine checkup on a newborn, only to be told a few minutes later that she's been reassigned to another patient. The parents are white supremacists and don't want Ruth, who is African American, to touch their child. The hospital complies with their request, but the next day, the baby goes into cardiac distress while Ruth is alone in the nursery. Does she obey orders or does she intervene?

Ruth hesitates before performing CPR and, as a result, is charged with a serious crime. Kennedy McQuarrie, a white public defender, takes her case but gives unexpected advice: Kennedy insists that mentioning race in the courtroom is not a winning strategy. Conflicted by Kennedy's counsel, Ruth tries to keep life as normal as possible for her familyespecially her teenage son-as the case becomes a media sensation. As the trial moves forward, Ruth and Kennedy must gain each other's trust, and come to see that what they've been taught their whole lives about others-and themselvesmight be wrong.

With incredible empathy, intelligence, and candor, Jodi Picoult tackles race, privilege, prejudice, justice, and compassion-and doesn't offer easy answers. Small Great Things is a remarkable achievement from a writer at the top of her game.

Payroll Protection Program Loan Received

When we rang in 2020, none of us could have imagined the path we would need to travel over these last few months. With COVID-19, worship has changed. For many, work has changed. Lives have changed.

Good Shepherd has been blessed with relatively consistent giving these past few months. As we do not know what the remainder of the year will bring, the Congregation Council made the decision to apply for a loan through the federal Paycheck Protection Program, also known as "PPP." The PPP is a loan designed to provide direct incentive for small businesses and non-profit organizations to keep their employees on the payroll and off unemployment. The Small Business Administration (SBA) will forgive these loans if all employees are retained and at least sixty percent of the loan proceeds are used exclusively for payroll; up to forty percent of the loan proceeds may be used for rent, mortgage interest, or utilities. A separate application for loan forgiveness is required. If the loan is not forgiven, the interest rate is 1% per year, and the loan with interest must be repaid within five years.

In July, Good Shepherd received a PPP loan in the amount of \$39,908. Of this amount \$15,356.96 was put in the Preschool checking account to cover the payroll that was paid in April through June to fulfill the contracts for the school year. Preschool contracts were able to be paid in full while tuition receipts were stopped for these months. The remainder of \$24,551.04 was added to the church checking account and has been used to pay the staff their full salaries since we were required to quarantine.

While the PPP is a loan and was not included as part of the 2020 budget, it is the intention of the Congregation Council to apply for full loan forgiveness once the funds have been received and fully dispersed, therefore incurring no additional costs.

Are you donating through the Good Shepherd Website? Considering it? Important Tips from the Treasurer

A few months ago it became possible to donate to Good Shepherd via the "Donate Now" button on our website (www.gskop.org) using a credit card or a debit directly from your bank account. Several members and guests have been using this new method of giving. Here are some suggestions for making donations via this method more effective. Contact Karen Lehman, Treasurer, if you have any questions. (karen_lehman@verizon.net)

Make donations monthly instead of weekly. There is a transaction fee for each online transaction, so it is better to make one monthly donation if possible rather than four or five weekly donations.

Choose to help offset the transaction and credit card fees. When you pay with a credit card the church is charged a fee, but you are given the opportunity to cover the fees. Also, with debit transactions you are given the opportunity to cover the transaction fee.

Use online banking via your banking institution. If you use online banking to pay your bills, you can set Good Shepherd up to receive your donation through this system and there are no extra fees to you or the church. Many of our members make their donations this way. Some have weekly payments sent to the church automatically and others do it monthly or twice a month.

Thank you to all who have been able to maintain your giving throughout this pandemic. We are grateful for your taking the time to mail in checks or adding Good Shepherd to your online banking or donating through the website. For anyone experiencing financial difficulties at this time, we understand and hold you in prayer.

Dear Good Shepherd Family,

On September 5, 2019, I had lunch with Pastor Julie and heard for the first time about the congregation with which I would be spending the upcoming year. I remember clearly what she said then: "They are such good people. They love Jesus, they love our seminarians, and they will love you." Little did we know, then, how that faithfulness in love would be put to the test, as our world quickly changed six months later. In a sense, I have had two fieldwork placements—six months of parish ministry as it had been, and six months of parish ministry as it is becoming.

The generosity of this congregation is astounding. You are people who not only proclaim the good news of resurrection but also go into your world as ambassadors

of new life in Christ. Where there is hunger, you feed. Where there is poverty, you give. Where there is loneliness, you visit. In the midst of the challenges of physical distance and the risks of contagious disease, you find new ways to gather, new ways to embrace, and new ways to carry on the mission of the church.
