We are now worshipping online and conducting meetings and classes through zoom. We continue to open our doors to Alcoholics Anonymous and we are still feeding the hungry once a month. And through it all, our members and friends continue to support our ministry, knowing that even though we are not worshipping in person, we still have ongoing expenses.

While we are eager to be back together again in person, we will do so only when we feel it is safe. Our church council is meeting regularly to discuss when, and how, we will gather again for worship on the hill. When we do gather again in person, we will take all necessary steps to make sure that we are following the guidelines set forth by our governor.

This summer will be different from others. Whatever it may bring, I pray that you will take time to give thanks for all your blessings. I know that I will be giving thanks for you, Good Shepherd.

JUNE OUTREACH

June outreach funds will go to support Lutheran World Relief. Lutheran World Relief is in need of funding for their outreach to prepare countries in Africa for the COVID-19 pandemic. The money will go to help train health care workers. Currently there are only 1-2 providers to serve several villages. These workers need protective equipment supplies, up-to-date information, and water filtration kits to provide plentiful, clean running water. LWR serves as a bridge between reputable sources of information, such as the World Health Organization, health care systems and workers in vulnerable communities. We can help slow the spread of of the virus there and in similar programs in Asia and South and Central America. Checks may be made payable to Good Shepherd and marked "Outreach."



JULY & AUGUST OUTREACH

July & August outreach funds will go to support Feeding America. During these pandemic times there are more families who are food insufficient. Feeding America is the largest hunger-relief program in the United States. Through their COVID-19 Response Fund

they are raising money to support people facing hunger and the food banks that support them. They also are working with school districts and local government to support programs to help the 22 million children who receive school lunches. They provide grants to food banks, emergency food boxes and distribute food and non-food items (such as cleaning supplies, diapers, etc). UPDATE FROM CECIL AND GRACE BEAN SOUP KITCHEN And GOOD SHEPHERD MEAL MINISTRY

Bill Rinker from the soup kitchen said that the Episcopal Diocese upgraded the dining room recently with a new floor and a coat of paint. They received 2 Covid grants recently that helped pay for new tables and chairs that can be better sanitized between uses. It will also pay for food that they need to provide for several meals a week. They recently lost 2 of their groups of volunteers due to the health risks. We continue to provide a bag lunch meal once per month. We now make the sandwiches and bag lunches on Friday (with a small group of 4-5 volunteers) and deliver them Saturday morning for their breakfast volunteers to distribute through the door with their hot breakfast. This way our cousins only have to come out once to get 2 meals. At times they have lots of cousins and new faces. A couple of times their numbers were lower when stimulus checks arrived. When they do have meals leftover, they take them to the shelter in Norristown. The guests there are not allowed to leave the building as they normally would, so the shelter now has to provide 3 meals a day and they are happy to have what they can get. Bill said they are so very grateful for all that we provide. You can donate to our meal ministry by sending a check to Good Shepherd and label it for meal ministry. 
SUMMER BOOK CLUB AT GOOD SHEPHERD

Monday, June 29— The Henna Artist by Alka Joshi—Escaping from an abusive marriage, seventeen-year-old Lakshmi makes her way alone to the vibrant 1950s pink city of Jaipur. There she becomes the most highly requested henna artist—and confidante—to the wealthy women of the upper class. But trusted with the secrets of the wealthy, she can never reveal her own...

Known for her original designs and sage advice, Lakshmi must tread carefully to avoid the jealous gossips who could ruin her reputation and her livelihood. As she pursues her dream of an independent life, she is startled one day when she is confronted by her husband, who has tracked her down these many years later with a high-spirited young girl in tow—a sister Lakshmi never knew she had. Suddenly the caution that she has carefully cultivated as protection is threatened. Still she perseveres, applying her talents and lifting up those that surround her as she does.



Tuesday, July 21— The Rest of Her Life by Laura Moriarty In The Rest of Her Life, Laura Moriarty delivers a luminous, compassionate, and provocative look at how mothers and daughters with the best intentions can be blind to the harm they do to one another.

Leigh is the mother of high-achieving, popular high school senior Kara. Their relationship is already strained for reasons Leigh does not fully understand when, in a moment of carelessness, Kara makes a mistake that ends in tragedy--the effects of which not only divide Leigh's family, but polarize the entire community. We see the story from Leigh's

perspective, as she grapples with the hard reality of what her daughter has done and the devastating consequences her actions have on the family of another teenage girl in town, all while struggling to protect Kara in the face of rising public outcry.

Like the best works of Jane Hamilton, Jodi Picoult, and Alice Sebold, Laura Moriarty's *The Rest of Her Life* is a novel of complex moral dilemma, filled with nuanced characters and a page-turning plot that makes readers ask themselves, "What would I do?"



Monday, August 24—The Lost Girls of Paris by Pam Jenoff—1946, Manhattan. One morning while passing through Grand Central Terminal on her way to work, Grace Healey finds an abandoned suitcase tucked beneath a bench. Unable to resist her own curiosity, Grace opens the suitcase, where she discovers a dozen photographs—each of a different woman. In a moment of impulse, Grace takes the photographs and quickly leaves the station.

Grace soon learns that the suitcase belonged to a woman named Eleanor Trigg, leader of a network of female secret agents who were deployed out of London during the war. Twelve of these women were sent to Occupied Europe as couriers and radio operators to aid the re-

sistance, but they never returned home, their fates a mystery. Setting out to learn the truth behind the women in the photographs, Grace finds herself drawn to a young mother turned agent named Marie, whose daring mission overseas reveals a remarkable story of friendship, valor and betrayal.

DURING THIS TIME OF COVID-19, THERE ARE A NUMBER OF WAYS THAT YOU CAN SUPPORT GOOD SHEPHERD AND ITS MINISTRIES

- 1. **Give to the Ongoing Expenses at Good Shepherd**—While we are not holding public worship during these days, we have ongoing expenses. - 2. **Give Globally to the Philippines**. The Congregation Council voted to support an appeal for help with an area in great need in the Philippines. Good Shepherd member Daniel Pirani has shared with us a message from his wife FC, who is from the Philippines and is currently there under lockdown. FC has shared that her neighbors have been impoverished by the effects of COVID-19. Checks may be made payable to Good Shepherd and mailed to the church marked "Philippine Appeal." You can watch a video from FC either on the Good Shepherd You Tube channel or in the weekly email blasts.
- 4. **Give Locally to the Upper Merion Assistance Community Cupboard.** During this time of Covid-19 the needs of the Upper Merion Food Cupboard are greater than ever. Presently they are collecting canned tuna and chicken and peanut butter crackers cereal, pasta, pasta sauce all sizes jars or cans, fruit cans or apple sauce (lunch box size), juice boxes, tortillas or tacos, Salsa, canned meals, canned beans and vegetables— all kinds, crackers/Ritz/Club/Graham, jelly, snack crackers/snack bags, granola/cereal bars and Ramen Soup. HOW CAN I DONATE FOOD TO UMACC? Any and all individual donations of cupboard items from empathetic and concerned neighbors are appreciated and welcomed! There is a drop off bin outside the UMACC doors—191 Town Center Road, the entrance is off of Independence Road. Please email the UMACC at Contact@UMACC.org with any questions.
- 5. Make Masks for Lutheran World Relief—Staying indoors with little to do? This request goes out to the Good Shepherd faith family and our friends. Lutheran World Relief has challenged the nation to a Face Mask Challenge with 75,000 masks their goal, to be reached by October 1st. (Visit this link for the particulars: https://lwr.org/masks) We, at Good Shepherd, have pledged 500 masks towards this goal. If you have a sewing machine and are interested in joining this challenge (fabric and elastic will be provided) you can email the Good Shepherd office at gskopstaff@verizon.net. Let us know how many masks you would like to sew. A pattern is available on the Lutheran World Relief link. If there's a mask pattern you have already been successful creating, your mask is also acceptable. The only requirement is that it must be made with 100%, 2 layered, cotton fabric. The fabric will be delivered to your home and completed masks can be dropped off in the church mailbox. We just ask that you let us know when you're making a drop-off so we can be sure to pick your masks up from the mailbox. The challenge comes to a close on October 1, 2020, but we would like to reach our 500 mask goal sooner. Consider joining us in this important outreach!

DO WHAT YOU NORMALLY DO AND HELP GOOD SHEPHERD IN THE PROCESS!

- 1. **Buying Gift Cards through Good Shepherd.** The amount of the rebate of each card goes to Good Shepherd. Maybe you're occasionally ordering take-out. Or how about paying for your prescriptions with a gift card? CVS, Rite Aid and Walgreens all participate in this rebate program. Consider paying using a gift card! There are also many, many restaurants to choose from: Chili's, Red Lobster, Maggiano's, Olive Garden, Seasons 52, Burger King, Arby's and Wendy's just to name a few. To view a complete list of participating retailers visit ShopWithScrip.com. The next Good Shepherd order will be placed on Sunday evening, June 7th. Email the church office (using GIFT CARDS in the subject line) with your card requests. (Checks, payable to Good Shepherd, will be collected when the cards are delivered.) You will be contacted to set up delivery of gift cards.
- 2. Amazon Smile—Amazon donates a portion of sales made through smile.amazon.com to the charitable organization of your choice. It is the same Amazon you know: same products, same prices, same service. Make sure you shop through smile.amazon.com and select Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd of King of Prussia. If you cannot find us by name, search by location using "Kng of Prussa, PA" (yes, with missing letters!).
- 3. **Save your Used Ink Cartridges**—Please leave your used ink cartridges in a plastic bag in the church mailbox or in the alcove outside of the office door. The used ink cartridges are turned in to Staples for credit, and save on the church's office supply expense.

ONLINE GIFT GIVING

Have you seen the new Donate Now button on the homepage of the Good Shepherd website? Clicking on it will take you to a new page that will allow you to make your gift online, from the comfort of your home or even your phone.

Good Shepherd has increased the number of ways in which you can give to our church, now including a credit card option. You can even split your gift among several different funds such as the monthly mission fund, a memorial, the capital appeal, the special appeal for the Philippines and your regular giving.

The first time you do this, you will be asked to complete a form including your name and address and enter the card number (debit or credit). You will be asked to create an account if you plan to give this way regularly or even periodically.

You will also have the opportunity to cover the fees when you make your contribution (3% of the contribution by credit card and 1% of the ACH contribution) and that will be added to your card. This will help the church tremendously by saving the credit card fees charged for this service.

Please know that your information will remain safe and secure on this site (look for the padlock on the top of the page) and only the financial secretary and treasurer will have access to the information about your gift. If you normally transfer money from your checking account, you can still do that. This is actually the preferred method because Good Shepherd is not charged a fee for this since the transaction comes directly from your


checking account. Please continue to use this method if you are happy with how it works for you.

The new online giving procedures are designed for the people who don't want to make a regular gift from their checking account or only want to give online periodically. This is also for people who are not currently members of the church and may want to give a memorial gift, support one of our many outreach ministries or simply give to our ongoing ministry needs. During the trial process we have had people make gifts after seeing our online worship services or make a memorial contribution in honor of a member.

SAVE THE DATE FOR MANNA MONDAY

And he's performed his gospel in churches and schools all the way from Wisconsin to Florida to North Carolina, to just down the road here at Villanova.

On behalf of our Church Council, staff, and consumers, we thank you for your generous gift of \$285 given towards our DeafCAN! program. For IRS purposes, we confirm that you have received no goods or services in exchange for your generous gift. **During this pandemic, we are doubly grateful!!**

In 2019, with support like yours, we served 278 different individuals and their families. That is a 19% increase over the 231 served in 2018. Most of that increase is from our new services with a large group Deaf Bhutanese who are reconnecting in Harrisburg from all over the United States. Also in 2019, our Fall Appeal increased to \$60,000 from many people like you in support of this work.

Now in 2020, DeafCAN! celebrates TEN YEARS of service to our Deaf Community, and we are even more committed to assisting those who are doubly/triply isolated, forgotten, and most in need:

- Justice & Mercy In February, we delivered a report with recommendations to the PA Dept of Corrections on how they can / should improve conditions for all D/HH men and women in PA (Federal, State, & County) who are either detained or under any kind of legal supervision.
- Welcoming the stranger As we continue weekly classes for those new to the United States in West Chester & NE Philadelphia, we also now serve over 35 new Deaf Bhutanese individuals and families in Harrisburg. (currently on hold as we reconnect remotely)
- Reaching out, teaching, advocating, & supporting Continue to teach weekly classes for
 intellectually and developmentally disabled deaf workers, provide outreach, education, and case
 management for Chester and Delaware Counties, teach ASL classes at three different levels,
 and provide sign language interpreting as needed.
- Finding a Way With no government support, <u>you</u> continue to support 30+ DeafBlind people in six counties with SSP services so they can find their way & inspire us all. (crucial now!)
- Telling their stories we are updating our website to highlight some of the wonderful people we work with so more people will know their stories and help DeafCAN! do even more.
