Good Shepherd Friends,

On March 15<sup>th</sup>, the U.S. Senate passed legislation that would make daylight savings time permanent starting in 2023. If the legislation became law, it would end the twice-annual changing of clocks. It is called the "Sunshine Protection Act." The Bill is a long way from becoming law. It still must pass the House of Representatives, before landing on the President's desk to be signed.

Everyone seems to have an opinion on the matter; however, the people I speak with seem to favor having permanent daylight savings time. Why? Because it takes their bodies too much time to adjust to the time change twice a year and no matter how hard they try to explain to their furry friends that everyone gets an extra hour of sleep that night, they just don't seem to understand.

But there are other reasons as well. It is believed that more daylight hours in the afternoon lead to fewer motor vehicle accidents. Children have more time to play outside after school and there is less seasonal depression. No matter what is decided for 2023, this year we are living with increasingly dark afternoons.

Darkness envelops these days of Advent. If the truth be told, darkness envelops not only the days of Advent, but all of our days. For most of us, the darkness is something we try and avoid. However, Barbara Brown Taylor, in her book, *Learning to Walk in the Dark* writes, "Darkness is shorthand for anything that scares me – either because I am sure that I do not have the resources to survive it or because I do not want to find out. The problem is this: when despite all my best efforts, the lights have gone off in my life, plunging me into the kind of darkness that turns my knees to water, I have not died. Instead, I have learned things in the dark that I could never have learned in the light, things that have saved my life over and over again, so that there is only one logical conclusion. I need darkness as much as I need light."

According to Taylor, darkness is not the enemy. If we don't run from the darkness, if we have the courage to sit patiently in it, our eyes will adjust. And when they do, we will see that we are with our beloved. There are others in there with us. Together we will light the candles on the wreath and wait patiently for the one who is to come.

Finally, thank you to everyone who participates in the music ministry for your time and dedication. Also, a big thank you to the congregation for your ongoing support.



**Adult Sunday School** meets on Sundays at 10:45am in the church library and via Zoom. The Zoom link is in the weekly blasts and the bulletin.





On Saturday, December 17, a group of volunteers will meet in the kitchen of GSKOP at 10:30 am to prepare the food. We will either make sandwiches or a hot casserole, depending on the availability of the new kitchen in Norristown. Another group of volunteers will meet at the soup kitchen at 12:30 pm to prepare the food for take-out or dine-in as the situation warrants. The church has graciously agreed to remodel the entire kitchen, and we await its completion.

When we begin the new year, please be careful when writing the date (**2023**) as the bank will reject checks with the incorrect year. Blessings to all!

### WANT TO SAVE ON TAXES and HELP GOOD SHEPHERD AT THE SAME TIME? WIN-WIN FOR ALL!

As you plan your donations to Good Shepherd, here are a couple of tax strategies that might benefit you either now or in the future:

- If you are older than 72 1/2 years and you draw down your Traditional IRA Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), the amount you take will be counted as taxable income to you. However, if you give a portion of your RMD to Good Shepherd (up to \$100,000) that amount will not count as taxable income to you, which could save you money and at the same time help Good Shepherd. You would simply have the company holding your IRA send the amount you desire directly to Good Shepherd. *Win-win situation for you and Good Shepherd*!
- If you have appreciated stocks that you have held for longer than a year, you can direct shares to Good Shepherd and take a charitable contribution and avoid paying taxes on the capital gain of those shares. *Win-win situation for you and Good Shepherd*!
- You might consider whether it makes sense for you to make two years' worth of your giving to Good Shepherd in one year, as that may give you the opportunity to take a charitable deduction this year. If you are interested in that, please let us know so that we can apportion your gift for 2022 and 2023.

As with all matters involving your financial plans, it is suggested that you speak to your financial advisor since everyone's tax and financial situation is unique.

### UPPER MERION AREA COMMUNITY CUPBOARD

The Upper Merion Area Community Cupboard (UMACC) is open to anyone who lives within the bounds of the Upper Merion Area School District and is hungry or food insufficient. The UMACC is a collaborative and



empathetic community response of our schools, municipalities, businesses, communities of faith, and caring neighbors. Our hope and goal is to strengthen our most vulnerable neighbors through food supplementation. The UMACC is located in the Valley Forge Presbyterian building (191 Town Center Road, KOP).

The following is a list of items needed the list is from the website for the UMACC. Diapers – all sizes but particularly 3, 4, 5, 6, Pull-ups size 3T, 4T, baby wipes, Formula – Similac, feminine products laundry detergent, almond or soy milk, boxes of small snacks (chips, popcorn, cookies, granola bars, fruit snacks), Ramen noodles, tea, Ritz, club or graham crackers, paper towels, canned chicken or tuna, boxes of small snack bags/cookies/trail mix, pasta, pasta sauce – all sizes jars or cans, canned meals (ravioli, spaghetti, chili, etc.), pancake mix, cereal, fruit cans or apple sauce (lunch box size), juice boxes, tortillas or tacos, salsa, beans (all kinds), jelly, snack crackers/snack bags.

All donations can be dropped off at the Community Cupboard. UMACC is located in the Valley Forge Presbyterian building (191 Town Center Road, KOP). The parking lot entrance is off Independence Road
